Sober Fun

When I was 11 months sober, I attended my first A.A. convention. I was asked to volunteer for a skit our young people's committee was going to hold. As I walked into the hotel, my jaw dropped when I realized there would be people that I hadn't met yet watching me in our murder mystery. Luckily, I was the first one to be “murdered” with silly string and only had to play dead on the stage until it was over. I remember hearing the laughter fill the ballroom. Something changed for me that night.

The next night there was a sobriety countdown at the main meeting. I was bummed I couldn't stand to be recognized for a year sober, having only two weeks shy of a year. As I watched people stand with 30-days than two weeks down to one day, my heart filled with joy to be a part of something so amazing. I caught the convention bug. One of my friends encouraged me to join the convention committee and see how it all comes together ... so I did. That same friend took me on tour with her for the next few months. Two weeks in, we went to Garden State Young People (GSYP) in North Jersey where the DJ announced my one year at the Saturday night dance!

The following month we went to Virginia (where she had gotten sober), attended another convention, and met some more amazing people. That summer, we went back to Virginia to attend VSCYPAA (Virginia State Conference of Young People in A.A.) and I recognized some of the people we met at the other Virginia conference. There were A.A.'s from all over. Whether I was selling soda at a dance, volunteering as a greeter, or chairing a meeting, becoming a part of the convention environment and service as a whole has been one of the greatest gifts of my sobriety. I met my husband while outreaching for PENNSCYPAA (Pennsylvania State Conference of Young People in A.A.) in Downingtown, Pennsylvania, and actually spoke with him in Springfield, Massachusetts at NECYPAA. But that is a whole other story...

There is a Solution

63rd Annual Area 11 Convention with Al-Anon Participation
Saturday, September 24, 2022

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Area 11 Convention was a weekend-long event hosted by the Area to provide a variety of workshops and meetings, and to create a setting for fellowship and carrying the message.

The last scheduled in-person Convention was to take place at the Stamford Hilton in the fall of 2020 before it was canceled by group conscience due to uncertainties surrounding COVID-19. In 2021, a small and dedicated group planned and executed Area 11's very first virtual convention. The event had close to 200 registrants. Many commented that although they missed being together in person, the spirit of the Convention shined through. The energy, enthusiasm, and A.A. message was carried by both the speakers and participants alike. This one-day event was held entirely online and supported by 7th Tradition contributions.

The success of the 2021 virtual convention inspired the 2022 Committee to present a virtual convention during the daytime program and feature the evening keynote speakers in a hybrid setting. The online day program will run from 8:30 am-4:00 pm. The hybrid evening program will run from 6:00 pm-10:00 pm at the Pitkin Community Center in Wethersfield, CT.

Our program committee has been working tirelessly to create a day of inspiring and inclusive topics and speakers, and of course, registrants will be able to take a trip through all Twelve Steps. We are looking forward to celebrating with an exciting sobriety countdown as well as our in-person A.A. and Al-Anon evening speakers. The Convention is being funded by voluntary 7th Tradition contributions. We are only as successful as the support we all receive. Registration is limited, so register early!

Whispers...

I was confined to my hospital bed. My girlfriend, sister, and daughter had their “anxious” faces on as they observed the sorry mess that was me. They knew me as a partner, brother, and father.

Let’s imagine for a moment that two spiritual entities are whispering:

“Do you think he will get it?”

“I don’t know, this is his first time.”

“I have seen his kind before, five bucks says he’ll be here again.”

“This was severe. I think he’ll get the message. I’ll take your bet.”

That was then...

During a meeting, as people were sharing, I came to the realization that through my drunken bouts, my God, my Higher Power (HP) had not only been whispering to me but was often shouting. My ears had been filled, not with cotton, but with wine bottle corks and bottle tops from a variety of distilleries.

I didn’t hear my HP when I scraped my car on a pole; met another doctor in another hospital; scraped my car on a something I don’t remember; ended up in a ditch and was introduced to some nice New York State Police people. *HP, stop shouting!*

Pray, the people in A.A. said. Wait for the miracle. Keep coming. Meeting-makers make it. Yada, yada, yada - sure. A.A. was my last resort. Nothing left. Tried most things. Okay, okay, okay – I’ll try prayer. Now get off my back. I sure landed on my back a few times. Drunk, passed out, puke on my shirt. Family looking down at me. Glad there were no photos. The memories are bad enough.

I prayed the prayer of a coward. “God, I am not willing to give up alcohol, but if YOU make me willing, then I will be willing”. Humph, that will show them. Be careful what you wish for. HP’s whisper was so soft I didn’t hear it at first. A week went by without a drink – I didn’t even realize it. Then HP’s whisper became louder – “Stay with me. You don’t need to drink.” As weeks went by without drinking, HP’s whisper became bolder. “It’s your choice now. I have given you the gift of sobriety, free and clear. I have always been with you – but now I ask that you hold me close.”

That was four years ago. I hear HP whispering to me all the time now. I hear it at every meeting and often over the phone. It is YOU. Yeah, you, and you, and you who share your trials, tribulation, and triumphs in your journey of sober living. I have always thought at meetings I was getting some good ideas and stuff like that – which I was. However, if I listen closely, I can hear the Spiritual Voice of A.A,

making its way around the room. Whispering, whispering, whispering – one meeting at a time – one day at a time.

More whispering:

“Pay up, you lost the bet”.

“Aw come on, we don’t have real money here”.

“It’s not the money you moron, it’s the principle”.

“Sheesh, here – it’s only Monopoly money anyway”.

Would you like to get involved in service at the district level?


