Let's Talk Finances

Serving as the Area Chair means I get an opportunity to connect with our Area's trusted servants on a regular basis. It truly gives me the feeling of being in the middle of the pack! One of the cool jobs I get to do is to serve on our Area 11 Finance Committee along with our Area Treasurer Ryan R, Alternate Treasurer Alfredo P and Delegate Mary E.K. My job on the committee...I'm the recording secretary and primary signer on all Area 11 contracts.

So, what's going on in Area 11 finances?

Tax season just wrapped up recently. You may be surprised to learn that Area 11 is in fact incorporated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Because we are a nonprofit, we don't pay taxes; however, we are required to file Form 990 which includes our contributions and income for the year. Our Treasurer and Alternate Treasurer work with our organization's accountants to get this completed.

Another significant effort put in this year by the Finance Committee has been our work with CSCYPAA and the Area 11 Convention to negotiate hotel contracts for their events. The world has changed the last few years quite a bit and it's reflected in prices when putting on large events. Luckily, we have a lot of experience to draw on and do our best to make sure we are agreeing on financially responsible contracts to help our event committees 7th tradition. While they may be event committees, they are working hard (just like your home group does) to be fully self-supporting.

Part of our Finance Committee's mission is to see how we can help our Area 11 committees carry AAs message through 7th Tradition contributions. How can we use our Area budget most effectively to carry the message? There are alcoholics who need our help; what are we doing to help show them how to find us?

Steps, Traditions, and Concepts Eight & Nine

Step Eight: "Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all."

Tradition Eight: "Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers."

Concept Eight: "The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of overall policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities."

Step Nine "Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others"

Tradition Nine: "A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve."

Concept Nine: "Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety. The primary world service leadership once exercised by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous."

Mirror, Mirror

Mirror, Mirror on the wall, who's the drunkest of them all. Before A.A., I would drink until I passed out ... which was most always. The morning after when I managed to straggle into the bathroom, I would always turn my head so I wouldn't see myself in the large bathroom mirror. The "me" in the mirror most certainly had words for me. Words I knew I should hear — words I wouldn't listen to. The same words my friends and family wanted to say to me - I didn't want to listen. The words hung in the air: "Help me, I am killing myself, one drink at a time".

I didn't need the poison apple as in the story of "Snow White" and seven height-challenged men. I was handed the poison bottle. This bottle I gladly embraced. Oh, how I loved that bottle. One hundred proof whiskey. Today I shudder at what I was doing to myself - at death's door - banging on it with my bottle.

It was a singularly troubling journey to the rooms of A.A. Two years of not knowing what existed outside of the bottle and still going to meetings. I was caught a few times ... they knew a drunk's excuses when they heard them. I often asked myself: "Was there life after the bottle?" How was I to cope? I was alone in a crowded room of alcoholics. I felt as if I was in one of those movie scenes where the person is standing in Time's Square and people are swirling around them. I was clueless.

"God did for me what I could not do for myself."

When I truly came into the rooms of A.A., I claimed the seat for which I had paid thousands of dollars. All that in addition to the suffering and misery I caused myself and others. I don't need to tell you that - we have each traveled that path at different times.

As a practitioner of A.A,'s program, I can look in the mirror and now see a sober "me". Though I am still an old fart, I do look years younger. I can see the whites of my eyes and not the red veins of a drunk. The haggard face is gone. Unfortunately, my hair didn't grow back like I had hoped. I guess there is a limit to what I can expect when putting the drink aside.

Snow White had those seven height-challenged guys to help her around the cottage. At the very moment of her need, they were off in the woods doing who knows what. We in A.A. have more than seven people in our story. We have rooms full of people, big, tall, small, chubby, thin, bald and hairy. They have a central role in my story of recovery. Snow White had to wait for a kiss from some stupid prince. I get hugs and glad hands all the time at meetings. The A.A. fellowship is my favorite story. I am grateful for the opportunity to live a sober life — "One Day at a Time".
